

PUTTING GRANTS TO WORK FOR COLFAX





The City of Colfax made a big move into 20 W. Howard Street, renovating the vacant historic building for city hall, Police Department, and Main Street offices. Main Street Iowa awarded the City of Colfax the Best Building Rehabilitation Project for Communities under 5,000 for the project.

Volunteers and city staff planted over 100 trees downtown, at Quarry Springs Park, and in other city parks thanks to a DNR Derecho Tree Grant.



State Revolving Loan Funding provided low interest loans to defray the cost of water system improvements, which reduces the frequency of water main breaks.

In coming years the city will continue to seek grants for other improvements. Conceptual renderings of some possible projects are shown below.






COLFAX COMMUNITY PRIDE

To best represent the City of Colfax, we developed a new logo, city seal, secondary shield, and flag, which are pictured below.



We also improved our online presence by launching a new website and Facebook page.







In 2022 the Colfax named the bridge over the Skunk River for Staff Sergeant Herschel F. "Pete" Briles, a Colfax native and World War II hero. Staff Sergeant Briles received the Presidential Medal of Honor for his service. His heroic initiative under heavy fire led to the surrender of 55 German soldiers and saved the lives of numerous wounded comrades. The City is exploring partnerships with other governmental entities to further honor Staff Sergeant Briles by making aesthetic enhancements to the bridge.

With sponsorship by Dickerson Mechanical, Colfax launched a monthly best yard contest in 2021 that runs May - October. The winners receive \$50 Colfax Downtown Bucks, a Colfax flag, and an entry into the yearly grand prize drawing for \$300 Colfax Downtown Bucks.



In 2022, the city made the difficult decision to demolish the historic Briggs building to prevent catastrophic collapse. The city is now taking proposals from developers to add to our historic downtown. The city is working on adopting design standards to ensure that our historic downtown continues to look great.



The city donated 11.34 acres helping to make the Colfax-Mingo Jr./Sr. High School expansion possible.




This updated billboard welcomes people to our community on Interstate 80.






Epworth Acres features seven lots north of the high school.

FIRE & EMS DEPARTMENT

Colfax Fire Dept is a volunteer department made up of:

- 3 Paramedics

The department is always looking for more volunteers to join and help their fellow citizens. Members can choose ambulance or fire priority or both.

With changing times in emergency medical services, our goal is to train our members to give the best care possible under current standards.



FIRE & EMS Highlights

- The department has a call volume of 300 ambulance calls per year and 80 fire calls per year.
- Department equipment includes:
 - o Three 1500 gallons Pumper-Tankers
 - o 3 Quick-Attack units ranging from a Ranger to a 4-wheel drive trucks,
 - o A water rescue boat, and
 - o An enclosed trailer with Haz-Mat and water rescue equipment.

Library Highlights

In fiscal year 2022:

- 5,512 individuals visited the Colfax Public Library
- 4,805 physical materials were checked out
- 2,881 digital books and/or magazines were checked out
- Public computers were used 1,549 times
- Wi-Fi was accessed 841 times
- 327 individuals attended live programming events
